

**BULLIS SCHOOL STUDENT-ATHLETE NAMED  
GATORADE MARYLAND BOYS TRACK AND FIELD PLAYER OF THE YEAR**

CHICAGO (June 26, 2026) — In its 41<sup>st</sup> year celebrating the nation’s best high school athletes, Gatorade today announced Quincy Wilson of Bullis School is the 2025-26 Gatorade Maryland Boys Track and Field Player of the Year.

Gatorade Player of the Year is the top honor in high school sports, celebrating the nation’s best high school athletes for their excellence in sport, academics and community. The award recognizes Wilson as Maryland’s best high school boys track and field athlete and he joins an elite legacy that spans professional athletes and coaches to CEOs, such as Alan Webb (2000-01, South Lakes High School, Virginia), Kerron Clement (2002-03, Laporte High School, Texas) and Tate Taylor (2024-25, Harlan High School, Texas).

The state’s returning Gatorade Player of the Year, the 5-foot-9, 153-pound senior sprinter clocked the second-fastest 400-meter time in the nation this past season, crossing the line in 44.84 seconds to finish second at the USATF Under-20 Championships. Wilson also ran the anchor leg of the second-place 4x400 relay team at New Balance Nationals to earn All-American status. This spring also included 400-meter wins at both the Pepsi Relays in 45.97 and the Arcadia Invitational in 45.48. The World U18 record holder in the 400 with a time of 44.10 in 2025, Wilson also clocked a 400 hurdles time of 52.52 this season, which ranked No. 19 nationally among prep boys competitors. He is now a three-time Gatorade Maryland Player of the Year in boys track.

An active member of the Bullis School’s Black Student Union, Wilson has volunteered locally with the Wayman Good Hope African Methodist Episcopal Church. He has also assisted with an effort to donate athletic shoes in association with the church’s youth group. “Quincy Wilson will go down as one of the greatest single-lap racers in high school history,” said Rich Gonzalez, editor of PrepCalTrack.com. “He would be a candidate for Gatorade track honors on the basis of his indoor season alone, in my view, but his wins at the Arcadia Invitational and the Pepsi Florida Relays this spring followed by his silver medal and All-American honors at Nike Outdoor Nationals earlier this month are proof of his continued prowess. He’ll graduate with eight ISL/IAC/MAC or DMV outdoor championships and, of course, who can forget his making the 2024 U.S. Olympic Team.”

Wilson has maintained an A average in the classroom. He has signed a written letter of athletic aid to compete on scholarship at the University of Maryland this fall.

The [Gatorade Player of the Year](#) program annually recognizes one state winner from each of the 50 states and Washington D.C., in 12 different sports: football, girls volleyball, boys and girls cross country, boys and girls basketball, baseball, softball, boys and girls soccer, and boys and girls track & field. In total, 610 high school athletes are honored each year. From the pool of state winners, one national winner is selected in each of the 12 sports. The selection process is administered by the Gatorade Player of the Year Selection Committee, which leverages experts including coaches, scouts, media and others as sources to help evaluate and determine the winners in each sport.

As part of Gatorade’s commitment to breaking down barriers in sport, every Player of the Year also receives a grant to donate to a social impact partner. To date, the Gatorade Player of the Year program has provided more than \$6.4 million in grants to winners across more than 2,200 organizations.
