The 5-foot-6 junior midfielder scored four goals and passed for 12 assists this past season, leading the Cavaliers (8-6-2) to the state tournament semifinals. Medler was the Soccer605.com Small Program Player of the Year and an Honorable Mention All-State selection. She concluded her junior year with a career total of 13 goals.

Medler has maintained a 3.97 GPA in the classroom. She attends Douglas High, which does not have a soccer team. She has volunteered locally as part of multiple community-service initiatives in association with the National Honor Society.

"I really enjoyed watching KJ Medler with the ball," said Kayla Braffet, head coach of Mitchell High. "She was one of the few girls that stood out to me. She was always very composed and could read the field well."

Medler has made a verbal commitment to attend South Dakota State University beginning in the fall of 2015.
