ALBEMARLE HIGH SCHOOL STANDOUT NAMED GATORADE VIRGINIA BOYS SOCCER PLAYER OF THE YEAR

CHICAGO (May 11, 2015) — In its 30th year of honoring the nation's best high school athletes, The Gatorade Company, in collaboration with USA TODAY High School Sports, today announced Marcel Berry of Albemarle High School as its 2014-15 Gatorade Virginia Boys Soccer Player of the Year. Berry is the first Gatorade Virginia Boys Soccer Player of the Year to be chosen from Albemarle High School.

The award, which recognizes not only outstanding athletic excellence, but also high standards of academic achievement and exemplary character demonstrated on and off the field, distinguishes Berry as Virginia's best high school boys soccer player. Now a finalist for the prestigious Gatorade National Boys Soccer Player of the Year award to be announced in May, Berry joins an elite alumni association of past state award-winners in 12 sports, including Abby Wambach (1997-98, Our Lady of Mercy, N.Y.), Derek Jeter (1991-92, Kalamazoo HS, Mich.), Candace Parker (2001-02, Naperville Central HS, Ill.), Alexi Lalas (1987-88, Cranbrook HS, Mich.), Heather O'Reilly (2001-02, East Brunswick HS, N.J.) and Mark Sanchez (2004-05, Mission Viejo HS, Calif.).

The 5-foot-8, 145-pound senior forward had led the Patriots to an 11-0-1 record at the time of his selection. Berry scored 21 goals and passed for eight assists through 12 games. A member of the U.S. Youth Soccer Region I Olympic Development Program team, he was a 2014 Class 5A First Team All-State selection and the 2014 Conference 16 Player of the Year.

Berry has maintained a weighted 3.69 GPA in the classroom. A member of Albemarle High's African-American Scholars Alliance, he has volunteered locally as an elementary school teaching assistant and as a youth soccer referee.

"Marcel Berry is very technical and possesses great pace with and without the ball," said Andrew Offineer, head coach of Mountain View High. "He commands his opponents' attention constantly and can punish them when they fail to account for his pace and technical ability."

Berry has signed a National Letter of Intent to play soccer on an athletic scholarship at the College of William & Mary beginning this fall.

The <u>Gatorade Player of the Year</u> program annually recognizes one winner in the District of Columbia and each of the 50 states that sanction high school football, girls volleyball, boys and girls cross country, boys and girls basketball, boys and girls soccer, baseball, softball, and boys and girls track & field, and awards one National Player of the Year in each sport. The selection process is administered by the Gatorade high school sports leadership team in partnership with <u>USA TODAY High School Sports</u>, which work with top sport-specific experts and a media advisory board of accomplished, veteran prep sports journalists to determine the state winners in each sport.
