SISSONVILLE HIGH SCHOOL STANDOUT NAMED GATORADE® WEST VIRGINIA SOFTBALL PLAYER OF THE YEAR

CHICAGO (June 2, 2016) — In its 31st year of honoring the nation's best high school athletes, The Gatorade Company, in collaboration with USA TODAY High School Sports, today announced Alexee Haynes of Sissonville High School as its 2015-16 Gatorade West Virginia Softball Player of the Year. Haynes is the second Gatorade West Virginia Softball Player of the Year to be chosen from Sissonville High School.

The 5-foot-8 senior third baseman and right-handed pitcher led the Indians (26-9) to the regional final this past season. Haynes compiled a .612 batting average with seven home runs, 55 RBI and 60 runs scored. The Kanawha Valley Player of the Year, she also posted an 8-2 record in the circle with a 0.99 ERA. Haynes is a three-time First Team All-State honoree.

Haynes has maintained a 4.36 GPA in the classroom. She has volunteered locally on behalf of the Special Olympics.

"She's an elite talent—she can really do anything on a softball field," said David Skeens, head coach at Poca High. "She's very hard to pitch to, because she has a lot of power, but she's excellent at making contact and going the opposite way if she has to. I've never seen her have a bad game."

Haynes has signed a National Letter of Intent to play softball on scholarship at the University of Pittsburgh this fall.

The Gatorade Player of the Year program annually recognizes one winner in the District of Columbia and each of the 50 states that sanction high school football, girls volleyball, boys and girls cross country, boys and girls basketball, boys and girls soccer, baseball, softball, and boys and girls track & field, and awards one National Player of the Year in each sport. The selection process is administered by the Gatorade high school sports leadership team in partnership with USA TODAY High School Sports, which work with top sport-specific experts and a media advisory board of accomplished, veteran prep sports journalists to determine the state winners in each sport.
