## HELLGATE HIGH SCHOOL STUDENT-ATHLETE NAMED GATORADE® MONTANA BOYS BASKETBALL PLAYER OF THE YEAR

**CHICAGO** (March 26, 2020) — In its 35<sup>th</sup> year of honoring the nation's best high school athletes, The Gatorade Company, today announced **Rollie Worster of Hellgate High School** as its **2019-20 Gatorade Montana Boys Basketball Player of the Year**. Worster is the fifth Gatorade Montana Boys Basketball Player of the Year to be chosen from Hellgate High School.

The award, which recognizes not only outstanding athletic excellence, but also high standards of academic achievement and exemplary character demonstrated on and off the field, distinguishes Worster as Montana's best high school boys basketball player. Now a finalist for the prestigious Gatorade National Boys Basketball Player of the Year award, Worster joins an elite alumni association of past state boys basketball award winners, including Karl-Anthony Towns (2012-13 & 2013-14, St. Joseph High School, N.J.), Dwight Howard (2003-04, Southwest Atlanta Christian Academy, Ga.), Chris Bosh (2001-02, Lincoln High School, Texas), Paul Pierce (1994-95, Inglewood High School, Calif.), Chauncey Billups (1993-94 & 1994-95, George Washington High School, Colo.) and Jason Kidd (1991-92, St. Joseph Notre Dame High School, Calif.).

The 6-foot-3, 205-pound senior guard led the Knights to a 21-0 record and the Class AA state tournament at the time of his selection. The state's returning Gatorade Boys Basketball Player of the Year, Worster averaged 20.7 points, 7.1 rebounds, 4.5 assists and 2.3 steals through the regular season. He is a three-time All-State and All-Conference selection.

Also a football standout, Worster has volunteered locally on behalf of youth basketball programs. "Rollie Worster can do it all," said Ross Gustafson, head coach at Flathead High. "He can score inside and out, pass, rebound and defend. He understands the game and sees the floor so well, and he seems to always make the correct read. His basketball IQ is one of the very best I've seen at the high school level."

Worster has maintained a 3.33 GPA in the classroom. He has signed a National Letter of Intent to play basketball on scholarship at Utah State University this fall.

Two-time winner Worster joins Gatorade Montana Boys Basketball Players of the Year Sam Beighle (2017-18, Sentinel High School), Brendan Howard (2016-17 & (2015-16, Great Falls High School), and Tres Tinkle (2014-15, Hellgate High School) among the state's list of former award winners.

The <u>Gatorade Player of the Year</u> program annually recognizes one winner in the District of Columbia and each of the 50 states that sanction high school football, girls volleyball, boys and girls cross country, boys and girls basketball, boys and girls soccer, baseball, softball, and boys and girls track & field, and awards one National Player of the Year in each sport. The selection process is administered by the Gatorade Player of the Year Selection Committee, which work with top sport-specific experts and a media advisory board of accomplished, veteran prep sports journalists to determine the state winners in each sport.

The 2019-2020 Gatorade National Boys Basketball Player of the Year announcement has been temporarily postponed due to the Coronavirus pandemic. To ensure the safety of everyone involved, The Gatorade Company will follow the guidance of experts and health officials as it determines the appropriate time to announce this year's winner.

As a part of Gatorade's cause marketing platform "Play it Forward," Worster also has the opportunity to award a \$1,000 grant to a local or national youth sports organization of his choosing. He is also eligible to submit an essay to win one of twelve \$10,000 spotlight grants for the organization of choice, which will be announced throughout the year.

Since the program's inception in 1985, Gatorade Player of the Year award recipients have won hundreds of professional and college championships, and many have also turned into pillars in their communities, becoming coaches, business owners and educators.
